Demetrius Guyton grew up hating his mother after she tried to kill him when he was a baby by lacing his bottle of milk with acid so she could cash in on a life insurance policy. Somehow he was able to do what may seem impossible - he forgave her.

emetrius Guyton was two months old when his mother tried to kill him. She laced his bottle of milk with hydrochloric acid so she could cash in on a \$25,000 life insurance policy. Miraculously, Demetrius survived but was left permanently scarred, a constant reminder of what his mother had done.

"I hated my mother," he admits in an interview with CBN. "I resented her very bad and it was horrible." His mother was sentenced to 15 years for first-degree assault. Aside from the scarring, Demetrius' nose collapsed due to the attack, leaving him with no nasal passages.

"I went through two years of intense surgical attention," he explains in his book, The Chosen One: A Touch from Above.

Then Demetrius' world changed again. "I was given into custody of some very, very hateful foster parents.... My only meal would be multiple slices of light bread."

He lived with three other boys there, including his own brother, although he didn't learn that they were related until later in life. When he was five years old, Demetrius went back to live with his grandmother. At school he faced ridicule, abuse and rejection.


"It was very terrible for me growing up because I had to deal with a lot of bullying, a lot of low self-esteem, a lot of everything that comes with being ostracized and alienated."

As a teenager, Demetrius started using drugs and joined a gang. Strangers who stared at his scars were often met with Demetrius' violent anger. As a result, he was in and out of juvenile detention on assault and battery charges.

When he was 20, Demetrius caught his girlfriend cheating on

"Being rejected like that and betrayed took me to a horrible, horrible place of anger," he says. He attacked the man he found her with and police arrested him on attempted murder charges. He was given a life sentence.

Demetrius worried about the attention his scars would bring behind bars but he was quickly

befriended by a Christian inmate.

As a high school dropout, he never learned to read or write but his new friend taught him using the Bible. The more Demetrius read

the Bible, the more he wanted to know about God. One night he was praying when he heard God speak to him: "I love you and I want to use you."

Demetrius started telling others about what had happened.

"I began to share transparently about how angry I used to be, how I used to hate Jesus, how [I used to think] He wasn't real and how even though I'm in this jungle He appeared to me and He's real."

Demetrius told CBN about a visiting speaker who had previously been cellmates with a woman who tried to kill her son.

"She was saying about this lady that had poisoned her son and she came to a place where she finally forgave herself and the speaker used that as a testimony of truth to try to empower us to forgive ourselves."

After the meeting, he spoke to the woman and confirmed that the woman she was talking about was his mother.

The speaker told Demetrius that Jesus had a purpose for his life. It was then that Demetrius finally surrendered his life to God.

"I fell on my knees and I began to cry out, tears began to leak out of my eyes: 'First of all, God thank You for manifesting Yourself to me and showing me that You are real. Second of all, thank You for dying for me and shedding Your blood for me. Third of all, forgive me for all of my sins and help me to live for You." As he prayed, Demetrius felt peace and joy wash over him.

Demetrius was granted early parole for good behavior and released after five years. Immedi-

ately, he found his mother and told her he forgave her.

"All I wanted to do was just tell her, 'I love you. I forgive you.' She fell on her knees and began to weep towards Jesus, thanking Him that I was alive, thanking Him that I had forgiven her."

"I had a soft heart towards God but I didn't know Him. Even though I talked to Him and asked Him things and needed Him in my life, I didn't know Him."

Perhaps it was this early sensitivity to God that made Katy say yes when a classmate invited her, when she was 14, to a youth camp for

Easter, where the highlight would be a passion play, which depicts the trial, suffering and crucifixion of

"I remember really enjoying the atmosphere at the camp," Katy says.

"I could feel the difference in the people and the warmth towards me. I felt really loved."

"I was trying to be mature; I was 14 and trying to put on my best voice and I said, 'I respect what your beliefs are but that sounds a bit too radical for me. That's not really my style.'

"I didn't even know what that meant to give my life to Jesus!

"It sounded so foreign. I was happy in my worldly life."

Not wanting to be rude, Katy stayed on till the final night of the camp – the night of the drama.

The play, which was interactive, began with a re-enactment of the last supper, where Jesus broke bread and handed it out to everyone.

As Katy handed the Katherian bread to the person next to her, "things got weird".

"I had a supernatural experience where I could feel bread in my hand.

"And then the person who was playing Jesus became Jesus and suddenly the Holy Spirit opened my eyes and I wasn't in that room anymore.

"I was actually in an encounter where I went to Calvary [the place Jesus was crucified].

I watched Him getting whipped, I watched the crown of thorns go on His head.

"By the time I got to the cross I was in love with Jesus.

"I'm like, 'Whoa, He did this for

Katy dissolved into tears.

"At that point I realised I was a sinner and that I needed a Saviour.

"And I said, 'If You died for me, I will live for You."

Her initial reluctance disappeared, to be replaced by a lifelong commitment.

"I knew I was signing up my whole

life to Jesus to give every day to Him.

"I had that feeling that my life wasn't my own anymore, like I had been brought with a price I was giving my life back to the one who bought it.

"It was powerful and I've never been the same since."

"He was no longer a distant person; He was real and right in front of me. I still can't get over it.

"In 24 hours I went from, 'Yeah thanks but no thanks' to being totally in love with Jesus."

Today Katy and her husband Daniel, who live in Alice Springs, devote their lives to spreading the gospel (the good news that Jesus died for our sins).

They are volunteers with Iris Global, an international mission-

ary organisation that provides humanitarian aid in Africa, the Americas, Asia, Europe and the Middle East.

Katy holds a special place in her heart for that Easter camp so many years ago.

"God uses anything and anyone and my encouragement to anyone with a dream to spread the gospel is that God will use your humble offering. He's not asking you to give what you don't have."

Quoting the miracle of the loaves and fish from Matthew 14: 13-21, she says: "Just give what you have and let Jesus make it into something miraculous and beautiful."

That's why Jesus came. Not just to teach us how to live right, important though that is, but to give us eternal life.


That's why we can call Good Friday "Good". It was the awful day that Jesus was tortured and executed, but it was also the day death died.





Prison chaplain's search for answers

rick Langat is a prison chaplain who speaks light into inmates suffering in darkness and shares the good news of Jesus's death and resurrection to anyone who will listen. Today, he says that God has immensely blessed him, his work and his family.

Things were not always smooth sailing, though. Before Erick came to know Jesus personally, he went through a stage of searching.

Erick says, "I was the last born in a family of six brothers and three sisters. I was brought up in a Christian family. I went to Sunday school as a child and Bible camps as a teenager. I first heard about Jesus in my Sunday school class but I did not understand what needed to happen to make it real. I was just doing the 'right' thing and serving God without really knowing Him."

It was not until Erick had finished his primary school exams and moved up to high school that he had a realisation that, just because his parents were Christians, it did not mean that he had a free ride to heaven. He needed to make that personal decision on his own.

This thought was further encouraged when he listened to a sermon during a rally and heard the Gospel [the good news of Jesus saving us from our sins] in full. He responded to the altar call and got saved.

"So, on the 2nd February, 2003, I gave my life to Christ," he relates. "I saw that life without Christ is useless. There were verses like Romans 5 and verse 8 that spoke to me. 'But God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

Erick previously struggled with ungratefulness. "Somebody would do something for me and I would not appreciate that they had helped me," he tells Challenge. Since his conversion, though, God has been working in Erick's life and helping him to overcome all of his struggles and sins.

"The biggest change in my life since that miraculous day is that I have been able to see that Christ has been

with me throughout the whole of my life. I have no doubt about it," he proclaims joyously.

"The best part of being a Christian is the truth expressed in the Bible in 2 Corinthians 5 and verse 17: Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away, behold all things have become new.' I am now blessed with a family and have two kids."

Erick's favourite verse from the Bible is Colossians 2:14, which says, 'Having cancelled the charge of our legal indebtedness, which stood against us and condemned us; He [Jesus] has taken it away, nailing it to the cross.'

"I would like to tell others that to come to Christ is life changing," he smiles.

Actor loses everything over one audition

ward-winning actor and producer Cameron Arnett was at the height of his career, climbing the Hollywood ladder and landing big roles in blockbuster movies like Star Trek: The Next Generation and Miami Vice when one audition ruined everything.

"I ended up evicted, divorced, alone. No agent, no acting jobs, nothing," he said.

What happened to have caused such a change of fortunes? Turns out Cameron had just been about to sign on the dotted line after his successful audition, when he was told one of the scenes required partial nudity.

He hesitated. Nudity did not sit well with Cameron's value system and he told the studio executives that. They said 'no problem', they would use a body double instead. Again Cameron refused. "Even with the body double, I felt God telling me people would still think it was me. It put a halt on everything. I felt God tap

me on the shoulder and say, 'You know, it's time to get out of the system."

Born in Haiti in 1960, Cameron moved to California in the 90's to pursue a career in acting and modelling. "Things were moving right along there," he said. "Then, I found myself in

Toronto, Canada doing a movie for a week. When I got back to L.A., they called me in by name, to audition for a TV series, which I ended up getting. It would have been my first lead in my own series."

It was for this series that Cameron was told about the need for him to be partially nude. Partial nudity would not seem to be that high a hurdle for a male actor in Hollywood, but Cameron was different. He is a Christian and had learned to listen to God's voice and follow His directions.

"It's all about God and not about us, no matter what platform He puts us on," Cameron said. "I want to be able to let people know that He's still Lord and He's still to be respected and honoured."

But obeying God had unpleasant consequences "The agency dropped me," Cameron recalled. "I lost everything – big house, cars, even family. I had nothing and no one," he said of those grim days, which also included a period of bankruptcy.

Later, Cameron felt God calling him to be a preacher. He moved to Atlanta

and started a church. "I thought I would never act again and I was completely fine with it," he said.

But God had other plans in store. Ten years on Cameron was able to step into a movie role again, this time in the Christian movie industry, and later start his own film production company.

Cameron now sees the production company as his ministry, and media and entertainment as his primary means of reaching people with the message of Jesus. His desire is to exalt God and the Bible through the shows and films he makes.

"One of my greatest joys in this is being able to collaborate with like-minded Christian filmmakers and artists. I love helping people be and do what they were ordained to by God. And as an actor, it is a joy to use the talent He gave me to honour Him within these various projects."

Cameron's recent faith-based movies include *Overcomer* and *I Still Believe*.

Today, he is happily married to BJ and they have a blended family of five children. He continues to run his production company, CAPS, with great success and founded Saving Destinies, an organisation dedicated to supporting and protecting young people.

He has published a series of children's books, is a public speaker, and continues to travel and shoot family-friendly films and other projects.

Talking about his decision to stick by his principals at that one audition years ago, Cameron said he has never looked back: "God sends everyone here for a reason, with a purpose, on a mission," he declares. "He leads and guides us in the way we should go. My life is a testimony of that. Our part is to obey, and as we do, He uses us to fulfil His will upon the earth."

Cameron urges others: "If you are a Christian, don't compromise God's integrity for man-made success. Be true to Him and to you. Honour Him and He will honour you."

On of Cameron's favourite Bible verses is Proverbs 19:21: 'Many are the plans in a person's heart, but it is the Lord's purpose that prevails.' This verse gives me the most comfort. It allows you to realise that as long as I am falling forward towards God, He's going to cause what He intended, to prevail."

HARD ROAD, SOFT HEART

■he fact Cindy Marais is alive today is a miracle. Her mother attempted to abort her twice – and since her traumatic birth she has faced abuse, trauma and grief almost every step of the way. But there has been a shining light with her since she was a teenager, giving her the strength to continue with when life seemed hopeless.

Three days after she was born, Cindy's parents left her and her older sister with a couple that they thought were their grandparents. She describes it as a "godly home with love, abundance and education."

Cindy explains, "This was a normal, fantastic

childhood, until I found out at age 10 that I was not family. This devastated me and the rejection was so bad that I decided to live with my mom and step dad... My world changed into an absolute nightmare. In this home I experienced drugs, alcohol, deception, adultery and poverty."

Cindy helped look after her siblings and learned to run the household while their mother was at the pub or smoking dagga or using narcotics and alcohol.

"This led to endless adulterous affairs, all while my stepfather was sexually molesting us. We moved from place to place, one year we were in three different schools, and three different provinces. This obviously created a huge impact on my school career."

School was the last thing on her Cindy's mind with so much going on at home

with so much going on at home and she left in standard 7 (grade 9).

At 14 Cindy was raped by a man who supplied her mother with drugs. Petrified, she kept the assault a secret. A turning point came soon after however when a friend invited her to a Scripture Union meeting. She had heard about God from the couple who had raised her but it wasn't until this meeting that she realised her

need for a saviour – Jesus – and gave her life to Him.

"I threw myself into the church, and felt accepted and loved," Cindy remembers.

Before long Cindy's mother and stepfather forbade her from going to church. She recalls her mother beating her and giving her 'medicine' from witchdoctors, but throughout it all she clung to hope in her faith.

"All I had hidden deep in my heart was Jesus. I was all alone in a world where I was so different in every way."

Cindy experienced multiple assaults by multi-

ple men. "I was haunted by this fear of men and started just giving in to them. I knew a guy that had been pursuing me for some time who was separated from his wife, but still married. He offered me his home and fell in love with me. For me this was a way out and I grabbed it. I then fell pregnant at the age of 18 and had a beautiful baby girl. But life changed and he started flirting with and running after other women. He loved to party and stopped working, leaving me to go back to work while he took care of our baby girl. We had to move into a garage, with no toilet or running

Cindy longed to give her daughter a better

life than she had had so she decided to leave her daughter's father and returned home.

After Cindy's mother stole her belongings and left for a new life in a new town, Cindy moved in with a friend and started a new life in Port Edward.

"I started devoting my life to God and was on fire for my Messiah. I met my husband – a man of honour, integrity and compassion, who taught me how to live and be a part of a family. He knew about my past but loved me and made me the queen of his life. God gave me a home, furniture and finally my own bed to lay my head on."

But tragedy struck again when after finally falling pregnant, their son, David, was stillborn at 39 weeks. The grief only compounded the rejection Cindy had experienced from before she was born.

"I then started focusing a bit on Cindy by God's

grace and started a career. So, at age 40 I decided to do my NQF4 and do my matric... which I passed with three distinctions!"

In 2018, Cindy opened a restaurant and ran it successfully for five years.

"But when Covid19 hit the world, this took my precious husband. I was too young to be a widow but I knew God had a plan. I said, 'Lord, you cannot give me all these tears, and not have a greater plan

for my life."

Last year Cindy gave up her business and began volunteering at child welfare. She also plans to launch an online ministry helping people deal with mental health issues, abuse and grief in the hopes that God will use her pain to help other people.

"I have forgiven my parents and only tell this story to bring honour to God," she says.

Looking back at her difficult life now, Cindy remains positive: "I always felt God had a plan for my life, and even though I felt abandoned, I knew God was with me. He was most certainly my strength and hope of a better life."

irm family discipline kept Isaac Moloko on the straight and narrow. It was hard when the crooked and easy way kept beckoning the young man with its promises of fun, and he admits he felt very limited.

"I was not allowed to go out at night or to play with other kids in the village," he tells Challenge News.

"Other families had rituals and initiation remonies Everyone else practiced them except my family and I really wanted to do the same thing to be accepted, but I had to abstain because of the strict environment of my family."

The reason for the stringent rules? Isaac's parents were Christians and wanted to shield their children from unbiblical practices or habits.

Even so, Isaac did flirt with some bad behaviour, admitting that he would lie to his father that he needed money to buy school books but keep the money for himself.

When his father left to study at Bible School, Isaac felt more cash-strapped than ever and resorted to stealing

"Yes I did those bad things, but because of my parents' guidance I was able to turn from that bad behavior and follow in their footsteps."

When he was 17, Isaac responded to an altar call at church to commit his life to Jesus. "My father never stopped stressing the need for me to come to Jesus,"

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MY ANXIETY PARALYSED ME

fter a traumatic event as a child, anxious thoughts would race though Cindy Rivera's mind, leaving her exhausted and frightened. Enduring years of this with no relief, she turned to alcohol and even attempted suicide twice. Finally Cindy found hope and the tools she needed to deal with her intrusive thoughts.

In a Delafe Testimonies video on YouTube, Cindy recalls when she was five and visiting extended family, she got into trouble for something. She ran to her 12-yearold uncle to tell him what happened.

"He said, 'Don't worry, it'll be okay,' and his hand started to wander," she shares. "At five years old I didn't understand what was happening but I knew that I felt so uncomfortable and shameful."

Cindy says she didn't want to get into trouble and told herself it must be "normal".

After this, Cindy recalls feeling fearful out of nowhere. "I felt so anxious and I would wake up in the middle of the night trembling," Cindy recalls. "I would have racing thoughts go through my mind. I was so scared that something bad was gonna happen... I would have thoughts of hurting myself or other people. I would see images in my

mind of things that would scare me and I didn't tell anyone."

In middle school, Cindy started drinking and smoking in the hopes it would numb her anxiety.

"But none of that was making me feel any better - it actually was making me feel worse."

As time went on, Cindy became overwhelmed with hopelessness that nothing was helping her anxiety.

"I tried to commit suicide two times," she admits.

After her second attempt, she cried out to God in her desperation: "Lord, I don't know if You're real but I need You to show up for me. I need You to come and



help me because if You don't I'm gonna do it again and I'm gonna succeed."

Not long after this, she heard an announcement at school inviting students to go to a Bible study and she decided to go.

It was there that she heard the good news about Jesus, that He had died on the cross for her and wanted a relation-

ship with her. "People were sharing their [stories]," Cindy recalls. "They shared how broken they were and how they were free now, and so that gave me a lot of hope. I thought,

'Wow, I want that. I want this Jesus that they're talking about.' So I continued to go and I gave my life to Jesus. I started to experience this peace that I had never felt

> She was given a Bible and began to read it. "I felt so loved," Cindy shares.

> > For a while she was free from the intrusive thoughts, but six months later, new thoughts

began to plague her. You're not really saved. This isn't real. Anxiety's still

here. What if you try to kill yourself again?

"I remember crying out to God and saying, 'God I can't do this. I won't get married, I won't have children because I don't want my husband to deal with this. I don't want my children to have it. I don't want to be scared to hurt myself or them."

Suddenly a thought dropped into her mind: "One day you're gonna talk about this with your husband."

At the time she dismissed it. But a few years later, she started dating

One day after church, he told her

about a dream he'd had about her.

"He said that in the dream I was much older and that I had a son and I looked at my son with a lot of love and that I was a great mother. When he told me that I began to cry because I hadn't told anyone besides the Lord about not wanting to have

kids because of anxiety. In that moment the Lord reminded me of what He said to me, that one day I was gonna talk about this with my husband."

Cindy recalls feeling a peace and the thoughts subsided again.

Three years later, Isaac and Cindy got engaged and Cindy was overjoyed. But a couple of months before the wedding, the anxious thoughts returned. Cindy remembers praying about her anxiety when God showed her a picture

I felt so

loved.

"I remember God telling me, 'I'm gonna give you the tools to be free from this forever and you're going to help others be free."

God showed Cindy how to "rewrite" the thoughts that popped into her mind.

When she had an anxious "what if" thought, she would choose to think about a positive "what if" scenario. When a negative image popped into her mind (for example, hurting herself), she would envision herself doing something positive (for example, praying for someone).

As Cindy put these strategies into practice, she realised she was living out 2 Corinthians 10:5: "casting down imaginations, and every high thing that is exalted against the knowledge of God, and bringing every thought into captivity to the obedience of Christ."

Through God's help, Cindy was able to forgive her uncle.

She is now a youth leader in her church and draws upon her experiences with anxiety to help young people.

No longer a slave

rancois Potgieter recalls a time when he felt angry and weighed down, like a heavy burden was on his back, lowering him into the posture of a slave. The peace, joy and freedom he experiences now seemed completely out of reach.

Francois tells *Challenge News* that he grew up in a Christian home but he realised he was only pretending to be a Christian for his family's sake. "In reality I was lost and filled with rage and all of the dark side of human nature," he admits. "I destroyed myself and everything around me."

Francois turned his back on God and searched for truth in other religions and philosophies.

"Yet the more I tried to deny Him the more I only saw His truth and undeniable evidence for His existence. I could no longer deny it and I surrendered, gave my heart to Him, and accepted His truth."

The difference in Francois' life was undeniable.

"I began to calm down and found peace and joy in my turmoil," he shares. "Life is not always easy but at least now I know I am not alone. I am able to face all my problems knowing my Lord God is with me.

"I may be judged, persecuted, belittled and more, yet I shall not fear for God is with me. I was lost, but now I am found. I have been a slave, but now I am free."

François' favourite Bible verses are John 3:16: "God loved the people of this world so much that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who has faith in him will have eternal life and never really die" and Romans 6:14: "For sin will no longer be a master over you, since you are not under Law [as slaves], but under [unmerited] grace [as recipients of God's favour and mercy]."

"What He did for me, He will do for everyone," Francois attests. "He paid the sacrifice for us because He loves us. He is our Father."





TOUGH GUY FINDS TRUE GRIT

ixed martial artist Beneil Dariush is currently ranked No.4 in the Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC) lightweight rankings but eight years ago he was pursuing a different sport.

Beneil and his family moved from their farm in Iran to America when he was nine. At 18 he began training in Brazilian jiu-jitsu and earned his black belt in five years. He became a no-gi world champion as a blue, purple, and brown belt.

He explains in an interview with Run N Tell on YouTube that he moved to UFC when he was 25 after his mother confided in him that the family was struggling financially.

"It's okay mom, I got it," Beneil told his mother.

"Then I went into my room and I sat down and I was like, 'Why did I say that? What am I gonna do?'"

Beneil considered quitting fighting and getting a 9-5 job but he hated the idea.

"I was in such a bad place, I actually started to pray," he recalls.

Beneil had been raised attending an Aramaic church at Easter and Christmas but he says it was more of a "cultural thing".

"So I just was like, 'Alright God, if You're real, if You're up there, give me something.' A week or two later, I got a call for a professional fight in Brazil."

The only problem was that it was a professional MMA fight and at

that point, Beneil had only trained in jiu-jitsu.

But when he was offered the opportunity to fight MMA, he says, "I didn't want to sound like a wimp," and agreed.

Beneil began training immediately for the fight, which was in six weeks.

Against the odds, he won the fight and the pay cheque that went with it. He remembers handing it over to his mother with pride until he realised his winnings wouldn't last forever. There were payments to be made every month.

"I went back into my room and I prayed again and I was just like, 'Alright, You did it once, but I need another one. I don't know if You're really up there. I need to know if that was really You."

Then he had a call from a friend, asking if Beneil could train with him. He agreed and after their first session, the friend insisted on paying Beneil.

"All of a sudden I was working with him three or four times a week. I got another coaching job somewhere else — they just kept offering me jobs to teach and all while still fighting."

Beneil was making enough money to survive which was bolstered every now and again by his fight wins. He says he started to feel guilty that it seemed as though he received everything he prayed for and wondered what God wanted from him in return.

He remembered an old wrestling coach he had who was also a pastor, Josh Holiday, and gave him a call. Josh invited him to come to

church and Beneil showed up the next weekend dressed in his Sunday

"[Josh] was wearing just jeans and a T-shirt and I was like, 'Okay I may have made a mistake here!' But I sat through the service. I was very uncomfortable.

"The music wasn't something I was used to, the message wasn't some-

thing I was used to... but then I showed up again the next week and the next week and as I was showing up something was happening. I kept hearing about Jesus and the sacrifice and the cross. So I picked up my Bible and I started reading it."

Beneil read the entire Bible from front to back.

He says he "started to understand the cross". When he finished reading it, he started again.

"At the same time I gave my life to the Lord," he shares.

Beneil now says he recognises that his talents come from God.

"The whole purpose of my career is to point to my Lord and Saviour Jesus," he says in an interview with Brian Sumner.

"People forget fighting isn't just

violence. It doesn't necessarily mean violence if two people stop for a fight — it all depends on their intentions ... I believe fighting is the ultimate form of competition ...

"I don't fight out of hate anymore, I don't fight out of anger anymore — I focus on being disciplined. I focus on what is my motivation and what is my goal. The goal is to glorify God."

Last year a video of Beneil went viral regarding his comments about Iranian protestors.

The demonstrations started in September when a woman was arrested for allegedly


ignoring the government's requirements to wear hijabs or head coverings. She died in custody three days later.

"My people in Iran, I know you are struggling," he said in an incage interview. "I know you are fighting for freedom. I want you guys to know we're praying for you and we love you."

He went on to say, "There is true freedom — a freedom that no one can take from you — in the name of Jesus Christ, the son of God. Don't ever forget that. If you remember one thing I say, remember that."

Some news outlets referred to his final comments as "bizarre", but for Beneil, his faith is the foundation of his life.

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
